I think it is hard to choose a professional like a psychologist based purely on their credentials. So I want to tell you a little bit about who I am and how I got here.

After graduating with a B.A. in psychology from Stetson University in 1975, I went to work at a private psychiatric hospital on the adolescent unit. After working at this intensive, milieu therapy inpatient unit for 1 1/2 years, I moved to Ohio to develop an adolescent treatment unit within the mental health department of a community hospital there. I returned to the South in 1980 to get my Masters degree in clinical psychology from Middle Tennessee State University, achieving it in 1981.

I worked for many years as a therapist at the Monroe Harding Children's Home in Nashville, TN until moving to Memphis, Tennessee in 1983 to become the Treatment Director of the Shelby County Juvenile Offenders Program. I worked there until entering the University of Memphis's Clinical Psychology program to achieve a doctorate that was completed in 1989. During this time at the University of Memphis, I became fascinated by neuropsychology and how the brain works. This paralleled my interest in psychotherapy and helping people overcome psychological problems. My internship was at the Bay Pines VAMC in St. Petersburg, Florida, focusing on medicine, neuropsychology and psychotherapy.

I then returned to Memphis where I worked at the Baptist Memorial Hospital Rehabilitation Center on the brain injury and spinal cord units. At this time I also began working in a private practice seeing psychotherapy patients. In 1993 I moved to Atlanta, Georgia and joined the Health and Rehabilitation Psychologist of Atlanta. We mainly served the Shepherd Center, a premier rehabilitation center. I was the neuropsychologist that helped develop Shepherd's first brain injury treatment program. I left Shepherd and started a private practice in Norcross, GA where I remain today.

Specialized Treatment

While working in my practice, I have been faculty and staff at Emory Center for Rehabilitation and Physical Medicine and staff at Southern Region Medical Center in College Park, GA. I have been a member of many organizations, including the American Psychological Association, Georgia Psychological Association, National Academy of Neuropsychology and the American Academy of Psychotherapists. Having held leadership positions in these organizations, I have since resigned from the organizations and focus my attention exclusively on my office practice and the National Treatment Centers for Environmental Disease
